Pool & Spa Safety Act **Enacted Into Law**

The Florida Swimming Pool Association (FSPA) is pleased to announce, along with the Association of Pool and Spa Professionals (APSP), the passage of the "Virginia Graeme Baker Pool and Spa Safety Act." This act, passed earlier in 2007 by the Senate Commerce Committee, was incorporated as Title IV of the omnibus energy bill approved by the Congress and signed by the President on December 19, 2007. The House of Representatives in July passed a slightly different version of the bill, but it is the Senate version that has now been enacted, with the full support of APSP and FSPA. Passage of this legislation is the culmination of a lengthy, intensive effort by both Houses of Congress to promote child safety in and around pools, spas and hot tubs.

In summary, the legislation establishes a grant program for the states to be administered by the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission. To be eligible, states would be required to enact laws adhering to safety guidelines in the new federal law. Safety education is also emphasized. Of particular note in setting forth guidelines, the bill addresses entrapment prevention and protective barriers around pools and hot tubs.

Entrapment Prevention. At the urging of APSP, the entrapment guidelines in the new law are consistent with the new ANSI/APSP-7 American National Standard for Suction Entrapment Avoidance. The standard provides that all swimming pools and spas are to use proper

anti-entrapment drain covers and circulation and drainage systems.

The 2007 Florida Building Code, which will go into effect October 1, 2008, provides that all residential pools follow the ANSI/APSP 7 Suction Entrapment Avoidance standard, which is consistent with the new federal law. The adoption of ANSI/ APSP-7 makes the Florida Building Code stronger and more effective in preventing all known forms of entrapment injury by requiring ASME approved covers on all drains and by requiring that pools and spas not be used whenever approved covers are absent, removed or damaged.

One year after enactment of Pool and Spa Safety Act, it will be unlawful for residential drain covers to be made or marketed that do not conform with anti-entrapment drain cover standards. Further, one year after enactment, all public pools must be retrofitted with appropriate antientrapment drain covers. This last provision was included by Senator Amy Klobuchar of Minnesota as a result of the tragic evisceration of a 6-year old child in a public wading pool in Minnesota this past summer.

The entrapment guidelines in the new law also call for the use of several enumerated devices, including an SVRS device, vent line, or other comparable device on installations that have one single main drain. The law specifically exempts from these requirements installations that do not have a single main drain, such as those with more than one drain or no drains.

Preventing entrapment tragedies

Entrapment deaths or injuries in pools and hot tubs are always tragic events. In the past few months, we've seen the disembowelment of a six-year old girl in a public wading pool in

Minnesota and the death of a sixyear old boy in a residential pool in Connecticut. Pool and spa drain entrapment has now made its way onto the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission's list of the top five household hazards.

Sensing a need to act, both houses of Congress are in the process of enacting pool and spa safety-related legislation that will impose certain safety regulations and offer incentives to states to strengthen existing legislation in connection with drowning as well as entrapment. APSP and the industry support these efforts and are committed to promoting the safe and sensible use of pools and hot tubs.

Very significantly, in 2006, ANSI/APSP-7 American National Standard for Suction Entrapment Avoidance in Swimming Pools, Wading Pools, Spas, Hot Tubs and Catch Basins was approved by ANSI. This standard addresses all forms of entrapment injury, including suction entrapment, body or limb entrapment, hair entanglement, and

evisceration. The standard provides several forms of protection, including multiple or unblockable outlets, drain covers that conform to ASME/ANSI 119.12.8, reduced flow rate, and other devices such as an SVRS or a vent line. Available information strongly indicates that several provisions in the ANSI/APSP-7 standard were not followed in each of the above tragedies. In each instance, there was reportedly a single drain, a broken, missing and/or non-compliant cover, and, most likely, a flow rate that exceeded the new ANSI/APSP-7 standard.

Through the efforts of APSP the proposed federal legislation is consistent with the new ANSI standard.

Preventing further tragedies of this type is a major priority for the industry and particularly the service sector, which has the most frequent and direct contact with pool owners, many of whom may not be aware of the risk in the first place. Below are several steps service providers can take to help prevent entrapment injuries and to protect themselves from negligent owners.

1. If you see something, say something. The recent incidents in both Minnesota and Connecticut reportedly involved drain covers that were not in place. There is no such thing as a "back-up" for this condition and ANSI/APSP-7 insists that when a cover is missing or broken the pool or spa must not be used. While no one can force owners to close their pools,

you should advise them accordingly, in the strongest of terms. Other potential hazards include single outlets without an SVRS, gravity system, vent line, or comparable device. Damaged pool covers, fences, latches or gates, nonfunctioning alarms and non-compliant slides or diving boards also represent potential hazards. While a pool service provider cannot generally inspect for all of the above, any visible hazard should be reported to the owner.

2. Know the Law. Beginning one year after passage of the federal legislation, all drain covers sold in the Unites States will have to comply with ASME/ANSI 119.12.8. The Senate bill also would require existing public pools to install outlet covers in compliance with this standard. The fact is, all pools and spas must have proper outlet covers in place. As the trusted pool professional, you should make your customers aware of this opportunity to further protect their families and guests.

The bills will provide incentives to states to adopt laws requiring that all new pools and spas be built with multiple outlets, unblockable outlets, or no outlets. Existing single outlet installations can also be retrofitted with multiple outlets or other devices that can help prevent certain forms of entrapment.

3. Put it in Writing. There is no safe way to operate or use a pool or spa that has a missing or broken outlet cover. These and other potentially non-compliant conditions should be brought to the attention of the owner.

Regrettably, not every owner will follow your advice, and, in the event of a tragedy and resultant lawsuit, they may even deny the conversation. It is therefore important to follow up your advice in writing, by email, certified letter, or both. The writing should confirm the conversation, identify the hazard, suggest a course of action (even if it is to contact "your dealer"), and remind them that failure to take action may expose their family and guests to risk of severe injury.

Any writing or e-mail should be retained permanently with the customer file or records. This will place you in the best possible position and may also increase the likelihood that a reluctant owner might take appropriate action.

Insurance Update

Harassment in the workplace (and other employment-related offenses). Are you covered?

Harassment and other employment-related offense suits are on the rise, even for the small business. That's why this month's insurance update revolves around employee-related lawsuits such as sexual harassment, wrongful termination and discrimination. Ask yourself as a business owner, "Am I covered from a lawsuit if my employee sues me for wrongful termination?" and "Am I covered if I am sued because one of my employees harasses my receptionist or my office manager?" Chances are the answer to both of those questions will be "no, you are not covered." In most instances, employment-related offenses are specifically excluded under the commercial general liability policy. In addition, employmentrelated offenses are not covered under a worker's compensation policy

So where do you turn for the coverage? The answer lies in the insurance coverage known as Employment Related Practices Liability or EPLI for short. EPLI covers employers against lawsuits relating to employment such as discrimination, harassment, violation of Federal Employment Acts, etc. It

also covers, and this is the big point, the defense of the claim. The actual monetary damage of a claim may be comparatively small, but the defense of an employment-related claim can be monstrous. You may know in your heart of hearts that you had proper grounds to fire an employee, but you will still have to defend yourself if that employee files a claim against you and your company.

Employment

Employment-related offenses can take years to defend, which leads to years of paying attorney fees. The defense of a claim can literally bankrupt your business. According to a survey conducted in the year 2000 by Tillinghast, the average employment-related suit costs \$350,000. Something else to consider: no business is immune from a lawsuit. Whether you have 5, 50 or 500 employees, every business can be sued by an employee for violation of their rights, wrongful termination or any employment-related offense. Cases of employment-related offenses are on the rise so now is the time to talk to your agent about employmentrelated practices liability and how it can protect your business before disaster strikes.

Barriers. The new law calls for "the enclosure of all residential pools and spas by barriers to entry that will effectively prevent small children from gaining unsupervised and unfettered access to the pool or spa". Current Florida law meets this minimum requirement. Chapter 515, Florida Statutes, passed in 2000 by, at that time, State legislator Debbie Wasserman Schultz, provides for the Residential Swimming Pool Safety Act. This Act was the model for the current federal legislation. This Florida law requires all residential swimming pools to have a barrier, meaning, a fence that is at least 4 feet high, a dwelling wall, or nondwelling wall, or any combination thereof, which completely surrounds the swimming pool, especially access from the residence or from the yard outside the barrier. The law also provides an option for a pool cover complying with ASTM F 1346 to meet the barrier requirement. The law further states that all doors and windows providing direct access from the home to the pool must be equipped with an exit alarm that has a minimum sound pressure rating of 85 dB A at 10 feet or that all doors providing direct access be equipped with a self-closing, self-latching device with a release mechanism placed no lower than 54 inches above the floor.

The Pool & Spa Safety Act is the product of the concerted efforts of many people, first and foremost Nancy Baker, mother of Virginia Graeme Baker for whom the legislation is named. Many Congressional members and staff also contributed to its success. On the

House side, particular credit goes to Congresswoman Debbie Wasserman Schultz of Florida, who has worked tirelessly in support of this legislation, as well as Congressman Bobby Rush of Illinois and Congressman Cliff Stearns of Florida, Chairman and Ranking Member, respectively, of the House Commerce, Trade and Consumer Protection Subcommittee. Senator David Pryor of Arkansas, Chairman of the Senate Consumer Affairs Subcommittee, steered the bill successfully through the Senate. It is noteworthy that in both the House and Senate, the legislation was the product of bi-partisan cooperation.

The Pool & Spa Safety Act is a highly significant achievement for APSP and the pool, spa and hot tub industry. Safety is a core belief of the swimming pool industry which guided our efforts throughout the process. APSP and FSPA participated effectively in both the House and Senate with a common sense message of how safety can most effectively be achieved that resonated well.

While the new law is mostly directive, not mandatory, it is extremely significant that the Congress is encouraging action at the state and local level, and providing guidelines that will make for a safer pool, spa and hot tub experience. The Act also lends valuable support to APSP's efforts to promote implementation of APSP standards, generally.

A sincere thanks to all within FSPA and APSP who participated in this successful legislative effort.

APSP publishes technical report on preventing suction entrapment in pools and spas

The Association of Pool and Spa Professionals (APSP) has published an in-depth study in conjunction with the publication of its new national standard for suction entrapment avoidance, ANSI/APSP-7 2006, American National Standard for Suction Entrapment Avoidance in Swimming Pools, Wading Pools, Spas, Hot Tubs, and Catch Basins.

The APSP report entitled "Technical Committee Report on Suction Outlet Safety and the Effectiveness of ANSI/APSP-7: October 5, 2007" cites the testing, research, and data collected by the APSP Technical Committee during the development of the standard and in support of the findings and requirements published in the standard.

The ANSI/APSP-7 standard is the first comprehensive approach to engineering swimming pools and spas to avoid suction entrapment hazards because it is the only standard that protects against all five types of entrapment injury and the three root causes of entrapment. Carvin DiGiovanni, APSP senior director, stated, "If pools and spas are installed and maintained in accordance with this standard, there should never be another suction entrapment incident. The new ANSI/APSP-7 standard codifies into a single standard the requirements of previous ANSI/APSP standards combined with the latest technology."

When it began to develop ANSI/APSP-7, the APSP Technical

Committee examined a survey of the Epidemiological Reports on Suction Entrapment collected by the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission and identified five types of entrapment. Through testing and research, the committee independently verified the five types of entrapment: 1) Hair; 2) Limb; 3) Body; 4) Mechanical Entrapment; and 5) Evisceration. There are three underlying conditions that cause these five types of suction entrapment: Suction, Water Velocity, and Mechanical Binding.

- 1. Suction. Suction is differential pressure and, with enough force, holds the victim underwater or causes evisceration (disembowelment) if the drain cover is missing or broken.
- 2. Water Velocity. Too much water velocity (flow rate) through a cover/grate causes hair to become entangled inside the cover holding the victim underwater.
- 3. Mechanical Binding. Mechanical binding involves an open pipe large enough for a person's hand/arm or foot/leg to be inserted. Once inserted, the limb cannot be easily removed, resulting in a mechanical binding entrapment. Recent incidences have shown that limb entrapments can happen with and without flowing water and suction. Mechanical hazards increase when flowing water and suction are present, causing the limb to be pulled further down the pipe, increasing the mechanical bind. Releasing the vacuum does not automatically release the limb due to

swelling.

Body entrapment, the primary focus of earlier codes and media attention, is only one form of entrapment. Some devices or systems initially adopted by code groups do not protect against all three underlying causes and therefore do not protect against all five forms of entrapment. For example, if there is a missing or broken cover, a child can still get a limb mechanically trapped in the open exposed pipe or sump, even with no water suction or pressure.

While suction vacuum release systems (SVRS) can be effective back ups in some situations, the only complete protection against all five forms of injury and all three hazard conditions is a securely fastened ASME compliant cover/grate, or no suction outlet at all. The October 5, 2007 report states: "The assertion that a simple "back-up" or redundancy can protect bathers from improperly installed or maintained pool circulation systems is misleading and dangerous."

The primary safety message is clear: There is no backup or 'layer of protection' against all five hazards if the cover/grate is missing or broken. A listed cover/grate is the only protection against all five hazards of suction entrapment. ANSI/APSP-7 emphasizes: Do not use the pool or spa if the cover for the suction outlet is missing, broken, or not securely fastened.

The scientific/engineering data

presented in the October 5, 2007 Technical Committee Report has advanced the knowledge of suction entrapment avoidance. 

Class," you may continue to use the clause, but you will be charged the non-member fee of \$2,500.00 per Arbitration.






