Renew... a good business decision

Every day you m a k e decisions for your business. Some decisions require careful thought; other decisions come up regularly

and take just a moment of your day. For example, when considering using a new product you probably do research, ask others about their experience and maybe give it your own test run. You weigh the pros and cons and costs and benefits before making that final decision. Workers' Compensation - The law doesn't require it, so why do I need it?

Florida state law offers specific requirements regarding how many employees a business must have before being required to carry workers' compensation coverage. The rules differ depending on whether you operate as a corporation, LLC, individual or sole proprietor; the number of employees you have; and whether your organization is classified as construction or nonconstruction. In this article, we will discuss a scenario for non-construction businesses.

When Stan's employee cut a finger while stocking shelves at Stan's Pool Supply Store, LLC, he required a stitch to stop the bleeding. Stan was shocked when presented with a bill from the urgent care clinic that treated the employee.

"I'm not required to carry workers' compensation," said Stan. "Why would I have to pay?"

His reaction might mirror your own. But just because the state doesn't require your firm to carry workers' compensation, don't be lulled into thinking you are not responsible for employee injuries. Actually, you might be responsible for more than you think.

The state requires non-construction businesses with four or more employees, either fulltime or part-time, to carry workers compensation. Sole proprietors and partners of a non-construction industry are not considered employees of the organization, whereas corporate officers are, unless they have filed exemptions.

Therefore, as a corporate officer, Stan is included as an employee of his pool supply store. Since two clerks work for him, one fulltime and one part-time, Stan's Pool Supply Store, LLC would not be obligated by the state to carry workers' compensation coverage.

However, Stan may still be held liable in the event of an injured employee. While a bill for a cut finger may seem affordable, complications can set in. What if the employee's injury develops an infection? A simple stitch can escalate, requiring expensive antibiotic medications and maybe even hospitalization. In addition, if the employee cannot work they may try to recover lost wages.

Stan's employee would be able to sue under tort law, alleging negligence by

the employer. Without the protection of a workers' compensation policy, Stan's Pool Supply Store, LLC may have to pay medical bills and lost wages.

Workers' compensation is available to all organizations, even those not required by the state to carry coverage. If a policy were in force, it would respond to the employee's injury, relinquishing Stan's Pool Supply Store, LLC of the unexpected, out-of-pocket expenses. Additionally, a workers' compensation policy serves as the sole remedy for employee injuries. In other words, the insurance policy would respond to the claim, not Stan's corporation.

What is your situation? Are you a corporation or sole proprietor? How many employees work for you? Is your business required to carry workers' compensation coverage? If not, are you prepared to assume the risk of employees' job-related injuries?

Check with your insurance agent for answers to these questions so you can make an informed decision regarding your risk.

Construction industry successful in fight to remove Merkley healthcare provision


In December, FSPA alerted members to a provision that was quietly inserted into the US Senate version of the healthcare bill on Christmas Eve. This provision, known as the Merkley amendment, was inserted by Sen. Jeff Merkley (D-OR) and would have arbitrarily singled out the ailing construction industry, excluding them from the broader small business exemption

in the bill. If this provision had not been removed, construction industry businesses with more than five employees and a payroll of \$250,000 would have been required to provide healthcare to employees. All other small businesses have a 50 employee exemption.

However, after many organizations rallied against this provision that targeted

the industry, the provision was removed from the final bill that the President signed into law. The construction industry will have the same 50 employee exemption that all other industries have under the new healthcare legislation. It is your responsibility

As business owners or management, there are many factors, such as payables and receivables, that have a direct impact on the viability of our businesses and indicate the status of our companies' financial stability.

The fact is, there are so many changes to the building codes and standards that

building officials can't keep up with this ever-burgeoning task. What we must do as responsible contractors is make sure we know what changes to the codes affect our particular discipline of construction and make sure everyone involved is up to date as well, such as our subcontractors. in-house personnel, etc. Keep in mind that pool construction is just a small portion of the work load put upon building officials.

A benefit of being a member of the FSPA is that we have a conduit to changes that directly affect our businesses. CPSC releases state guidelines for VGB Act grant eligibility

During March and April, the Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) released multiple new documents approved by the commission regarding the federal Virginia Graeme Baker Pool & Spa Safety Act (VGB Act). In the April issue of Florida Pool Prosm, FSPA reported that the CPSC adopted the APSP language on unblockable drains and approved a rule interpreting the definition of a "public accommodations facility" for purposes of the VGB Act.

The CPSC has now released its guidelines outlining the minimum requirements that states must meet before being eligible for federal grant monies under the VGB Act. These guidelines can be found in the CPSC final technical guidance document on section 1406 of the VGB Act and within the model state legislation the CPSC has provided, both of these documents can be obtained at www. poolsafety.gov/officials.html

The CPSC and CDC (Centers for

Disease Control and Prevention) have also announced that the VGB Act State Grant program is now accepting applications. the deadline for a state to apply is May 28. The CDC is administering the grant process for the CPSC. The minimum eligibility criteria to apply requires the state to have a statute calling for all pools and spas (existing and new construction) to be equipped with barriers and entrapment prevention devices.

Minimum barrier requirements follow what is currently in the Florida Barrier Law - proper fences and gates, approved alarms or self-closing latches if using a dwelling wall, and portable spas may use an approved lockable cover. Minimum entrapment prevention devices include multiple drain systems, a safety vacuum release system, a suction-limiting vent system, a gravity drainage system, an automatic pump shutoff system, an unblockable drain cover, or drain disablement. Portable spas certified

to UL 1563 are considered compliant with the VGB Act. All drains must have a VGB compliant drain cover as well.

At this time it does not appear there is any state that would be eligible for a grant. Although many states, like Florida, require new construction to meet the minimum requirements set out in the VGB Act, at this time there is no state with a blanket requirement on residential existing pools and spas. Unfortunately, the logistics of how to enforce such provisions are difficult. However, FSPA looks forward to working with regulators on finding mechanisms that could trigger compliance on existing pools and spas. In the interim, FSPA encourages all contractors to educate homeowners on the importance of making sure their pool or spa has installed systems that protect against drowning and entrapment per the VGB Act minimum guidelines provided by the CPSC.

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What do your dues do?

What does the membership dues you send to the Florida Swimming Pool Association do? All members should understand the basic answers to this question. If you don't know where your money goes then it is hard to justify spending it. The majority of your dues go to your local chapter, a percentage of your dues go to government relations and an administrative fee stays at the state office.

The money for government relations (approximately 25%) covers the costs associated with a full-time staff person and a contract lobbyist in Tallahassee who deal with legislative and regulatory issues. Without dedicated personnel fighting these battles, legislative and regulatory changes could be made that would affect the way you build or service every pool, impacting the expenses you incur on each job. Keeping you informed on what we are fighting, any changes pending, and what you need to do to comply before you are caught off guard provides a return on your investment of more than all of your annual dues.

Local chapter funding (approximately 65%) is used to help pay for meetings, pay for a local staff person, local pool safety activities, and encouraging the use of FSPA members to the community through referrals.

An administrative fee (approximately 10%) that is held at the state office covers your monthly newsletter *Florida Pool Prosm* and weekly e-newsletters, the consumer Web site promoting FSPA members, the industry Web site as a resource, membership processing and renewal, and insurance for the chapters.


The annual trade show is the primary revenue source for the association and, along with insurance dividends, provides personnel to run the association as the Board directs. Just to name a few things, staff at the state office manage the continuing education program, production of the newsletters, updating the Web sites,

industry promotion, printed publications, the arbitration program, expansion and management of member benefit programs, and answers to your questions and consumers' questions at the other end of the phone line.

While the above is a quick version of what your dues provide to your company, hopefully it helps makes your decision to renew your membership for another year easy. We are in a new decade and it is a great time for a new commitment to the industry.

The glowing green light to profit

In 2005 the green building movement was relatively small – only about two percent of both nonresidential (commercial and institutional) and residential constructionand valued at \$10 billion according to McGraw-Hill Construction's Green Outlook 2009 report. In 2009 the green market was approximately \$36 to \$49 billion and is projected to be between \$96 and \$140 billion by 2013.

So, in the face of generally negative market conditions and a wobbly economy, the green market has continued to grow and expectations are that we are in for more of the same.

How much of this growing market will the pool and spa industry embrace? Well, that is up to us, the manufacturers, designers and contractors in the swimming pool industry.

As an individual and in the work I do, I straddle both the swimming pool industry and the HVAC industry. I have years of experience in both and am a licensed contractor in both. Each of these industries has suffered in the face of the downturn in construction and the overall negative economic conditions. I have had the opportunity to observe both industries as the negative economy and the green wave has approached the marketplace.

I don't mean to step on toes and I certainly don't mean to imply that the HVAC industry is somehow more progressive than the pool industry. I would simply report from my own personal observations that the HVAC industry has done a much better job of embracing the changes the green wave has brought upon their market and they have found ways to make profit out of it.

At the same time I have witnessed a strong resistance from many quarters within the pool industry to the impending design changes that are making their way through the legislative process as well as products that, although more expensive up front, deliver green benefits to the owner/operator of pool systems. There are designs and equipment that are green in nature and will result in a lower cost of operation and ease of use of the pool environment.

I also can imagine the argument that air conditioning equipment is a necessity and therefore the added cost of green products is simply absorbed as the new normal while the swimming pool is a luxury and, as the argument goes, any mandated cost increases will only serve to shrink the market.

I say that is a lot of bunk! To quote a great sales guru, Chuck Reaves, "No one ever said your price was too high....and

meant it. They are really saying you have failed to convey the value the higher price supports."

We have many opportunities we can take advantage of with all the existing pools in the ground, as well as the new construction market that can turn the green movement into a green light to profits. It starts with embracing the concept, educating ourselves to be able to convey the value, and training our staff to properly apply these somewhat more sophisticated designs and products.

These include geothermal heating systems, water saving features and equipment, and improved hydraulic designs that result in lower energy use. Good grief, the number of spillover pool/spa combinations out there that, for the sake of good therapy action in the spa for an hour or two per week, over pump the pool system daily simply cry out for someone to sell variable or two-speed pumps. The pay back is there without even addressing the emotional value of being greener as a pool owner / operator.

The astute entrepreneurs among us are beginning to do this and are finding a way to make a buck. The key question then is, "Are you one of them?"

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2010 Florida Building Code Cycle - FSPA code proposals submitted

The deadline to submit proposals for the 2010 Florida Building Code cycle was April 2. FSPA made submissions which can be viewed by going to www. floridabuilding.org, clicking on the Proposed Code Modifications, then Find a Proposed Code Modification, and under Search Criteria type Jennifer Hatfield. A total of 12 code proposals were submitted by FSPA and by clicking on each one you can read the entire submitted proposal. A summary of what was submitted follows:

- Four Proposals were submitted relating to the UL 2017 pool alarm standard. Two remove inconsistencies between the Florida Building Code and UL 2017 standard, and two reference the updated revision of the UL 2017 alarm standard.
- · Two Proposals were submitted to

clean up references to the ANSI/ APSP standards and revise the ANSI/ APSP-5 standard to the updated rewrite, which should be completed in time for the TAC hearings.

 Six pool/spa energy related proposals were submitted; they revise the 2009 IECC language to include the Florida legislative pool/spa requirements, make changes to the pool cover requirements currently in the code, and insert the draft APSP-15 (residential pool energy efficiency standard) and the draft APSP-14 (portable spa energy efficiency standard) as compliance documents to meet the new legislative requirements.

A total of over 900 proposed code modifications were submitted for the 2010

Florida Building Code, 26 of these proposals relate in some ways to swimming pools and spas. In addition to the 12 FSPA submitted proposals, the following swimming pool/spa related modifications were submitted by other parties:

- Two proposals make clarifications to resolve issues with fixture requirements and panic hardware requirements when dealing with commercial pools. One proposal prevents adding unnecessary fixtures to a building that only serves a swimming pool and the other clarifies that panic hardware is not required on outdoor swimming pool fencing gates.
- Four proposals provide requirements for pools built in flood hazard

Opportunities abound

While the economy still demands the focus of our government leaders, the small business man must deal with the day-to-day decisions that have immediate impact on the bottom line. Most of our successes are measured in smaller increments (like payday on Friday!) than the fiscal policies of our chosen policy makers.

But while there is much gloom and doom in the forecast, the small business can often succeed and in fact prosper in tougher economic times. Many opportunities become available for organizations that have good fiscal control and long-term objectives.

Take employment for instance. The employment market is full of qualified, driven and responsible individuals that are looking for an opportunity to show their capabilities to a sound organization in the hopes of gaining permanent, long-term employment. The cost of employees has also declined in some degree due to a reduction in insurances and different forms of compensation. Now is a great time to interview prospective employees that a

company feels may help increase quality of service, knowledge and job skills that will in effect raise the standards of service that the customer ultimately feels. While we must be careful not to hire overqualified, short-term personnel that could use us as a stop gap measure before their next job, exposing our industry to the right people could uncover prospective employees that have quality skills that match our company's goals and can raise the level of our product.

Commercial property is another opportunity that has shown itself because of the economy. Lines of credit are at historical lows. If you are looking for a new location or just trying to find a way to set some roots down, few economic periods have shown the opportunity to own your own property or building as this current economy has. While there are a multitude of variables such as taxes, build-out and impact fees that must be considered when purchasing commercial property, there is no denying that there is a glut of commercial space available. Many are so affordable that they may ultimately be less expensive than rent. At the least, it can

give you a base to renegotiate your current rent with your existing landlord.

Large ticket, depreciable items such as trucks and trailers, and office equipment, such as computers and printers, have all seen price wars between competing manufacturers and retailers trying to lure your business to them. There are rebates and incentives that make upgrades not only attractive but no-brainers! Take advantage of these while you can. Hopefully companies can upgrade their business with a long-term approach that will not only increase efficiency but reduce total economic impact on their business.

While these are only a few instances that can be investigated to help increase productivity and hopefully improve your company's overall health, they are by no means the only beneficial items that can found in a down economy. By being fiscally sound with a good company direction, there are numerous opportunities to be taken advantage of in this economy. Opportunities abound!

publically recognized by Committee Chairman Dennis Jones (R-13). Members then broke up into their chapters to visit local legislators. Along with these group meetings, over 40 additional legislative offices were visited by our

members as they made their way through the Capitol.

After a whirlwind day at the Capitol on Wednesday, FSPA members spent Thursday in their regular Board meeting.

During the meeting, DBPR Secretary Charlie Liem, along with Director of Professions Jerry Wilson and CILB Executive Director GW Harrell, came by. They spoke to the Board about what the department has accomplished and its current initiatives. They took questions and listened to concerns from members regarding unlicensed activity and other pool/spa related topics. Secretary Liem reported on his meeting with FSPA in the DBPR "Bottom Line" newsletter the following day.

The annual Legislative Days was once again a great success. This event is a terrific way to let legislators know who the FSPA is, that we are watching what happens in Tallahassee, and that we continue to be an active participant in the process. areas. These proposals stem from recommendations made in 2009 by the FBC Flood Resistant Standards Workgroup and were previously reviewed by FSPA members.


- · Three proposals provide for requirements on existing residential pools and spas. The proposals limit existing residential pools and spas that are having alterations made from having to comply with all the requirements of the code. The proposals only require the pool and spa circulation components to be brought up to current code, in accordance with Chapter 41. It appears the language would only require existing residential pools and spas to comply with the ANSI/APSP-7 Suction Entrapment Avoidance Standard when undergoing some sort of alteration, repair or renovation. Compliance with current barrier requirements would not be required.
- · One proposal has been submitted to

remove the Florida specific language that exempts one and two family dwellings from the GFCI protection requirement for pool pump motors.

- Five other proposals have been submitted that do not appear to have a direct impact on swimming pool and spa code requirements; however, these proposals make changes that include requirements surrounding pools and spas:
 - One proposal restores the International Energy & Conservation Code language regarding air ventilation requirements.
 - One proposal renumbers Chapter 4, Building Code sections in order to retain language from the ICC base code – the affect would move pool and spa requirements from section 424 to section 435.
 - Three proposals make changes related to the coastal construction

control line requirements – they appear to only clean up the language to make it clearer for interpretation purposes.

The next step in the code cycle process is the open comment period that starts May 1 and concludes on June 15. The comment period is an opportunity for the public to comment on any of the 900 plus code proposals that have been submitted. During the month of May, FSPA will be reviewing the swimming pool/spa related proposals to determine if any comments will be submitted by the Association before the deadline. Anyone wishing to provide FSPA with input on any of the submitted proposals should contact the FSPA office or email Jennifer@floridapoolpro.com. Beginning in August, the Technical Advisory Committees of the FBC will review and vote on submitted proposals, with the full commission reviewing TAC recommendations in December. The 2010 Florida Building Code expected implementation date is December 31, 2011.




